

But this is dangerous ground and not germane to the main theme of this paper."



Paul Winfield 1941 - 2004

Paul Winfield, the veteran actor who appeared as both Captain Terrell in *Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan* and as Captain Dathon in the *Star Trek: The Next Generation* episode "Darmok," has died at the age of 62 of a heart attack.

Winfield had a long and varied career. He was discovered by Sidney Poitier and cast in *The Lost Man*. He played roles as diverse as Don King in *Tyson* and the police chief in *Dennis the Menace*. Winfield received an Oscar nomination for his role as Nathan Lee Morgan in *Sounder*, and he also earned Emmy nominations for the title role in the 1978 miniseries *King* and for *Roots: The Next Generations*. He won an Emmy in 1995 for a role on *Picket Fences* as a federal judge.

Actor and author Jack Larson, a friend, told Advocate.com that Winfield, who was openly gay in his life if not in the media, had been distraught over the past two years following the death of his longtime companion, Chuck Gillian. Larson produced the 1984 drama *Mike's Murder*, written and directed by gay film-maker James Bridges, in which Winfield gave one of his finest performances as a gay man distraught over the death of his onetime lover.

Winfield is survived by his sister, Patricia Wilson, of Las Vegas. (Sources: www.trektoday.com and www.advocate.com)


