May 25 – Of Wars, and, Memories, and Starlight, collection by Aliette de Bodard (moderator: Andy).

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
***** April 9, 2023 Meeting *****

As previously stated, I found Ben Bova's penultimate novel Uranus to be a disappointing read. (See my review in the March 2021 LSF newsletter.) I'm a long-time fan of Bova's so-called "Grand Tour" series, a dozen or so loosely-connected novels that collectively explore all of the Solar System's major bodies - but my experience with Uranus was such that I figured I'd have to think twice before going back to read any of the others. And then the Fates intervened. I was visiting southeastern Arizona over the Holidays and stopped off at the small desert town of Willcox. As I have on previous occasions, I dropped into the Friends of the Library bookstore - and there I found a hardback copy of Mars Life, one of Bova's earlier "Grand Tour" novels - cost: \$3.00. So I took the hint and purchased it - and finished it in a couple of days. A satisfying read.

Navajo geologist Jamie Waterman has a long and notable history with the Red Planet. His first trip to Mars was as part of a 13-person international scientific team (as told in the 1992 novel *Mars*). They stumbled across empty, unidentified ruins below the canyon rim of the Valles Marineris – but no signs of the builders (no art, no artifacts, no other physical remains). Waterman returned to Earth as a hero, traveling the world making speeches in support of efforts for a return mission to Mars. It took six

Rob announced Nebula Award finalist titles in several major categories.



years to organize a much larger second Mars mission, with Waterman as the Director. But the rise of reactionary, fundamentalist organizations around the world ensured that no government would provide funding - so Waterman's second Mars mission was sponsored by a consortium of corporations (as told in the 1999 novel Return to Mars). Waterman hoped to devote most of his time to a more extensive reexamination of the ancient cliff dwellings in the Valles Marineris, hoping to find out the secret of the planet's past inhabitants. Unfortunately, he increaseingly found himself needing to counter the demands of his corporate backers, who wanted to open up Mars for commercial exploitation, which he felt would interfere with any scientific study of the planet.

As Mars Life opens, Waterman and his wife have been brought back to Earth by the death of their son. Over the last few years, the New Morality has slowly been gaining power and influence throughout American society and government; and similar fundamentalist movements have been rising to power in other nations. Using "persuasion" and outright intimidation, these organizations have ensured that almost all news services and other media are no longer supportive of the "godless scientists" who, they insist, have manufactured evidence of life on Mars. As a result, the Mars mission might need to close down due to lack of funding. Dex Trumball, the Director of the Board in charge of Mars financing, believes that the only way to secure financing would be to open Mars up to wealthy tourists; but Waterman still resists the idea. Faced with the possible shut-down of the Mars mission, Waterman and his wife manage to return to Mars aboard the last of the scheduled supply ships. Meanwhile, a couple of the remaining scientific teams have made two great discoveries: evidence of surviving microbial life beneath the Martian regolith and a graveyard possibly containing the remains of members of the lost Martian race. Will Waterman compromise his long-held beliefs and allow Trumball to bring wealthy tour-

Atacama Desert

From the Atacama Desert of South America to the red sands of Mars... There's a connection here, trust me. You'll see in just a bit.

The Atacama Desert is the driest non-polar desert in the world. It is located between mountain chains along the Pacific Coast of Chile, at an altitude of over three miles. Stretches of this stony desert plateau receive almost no rain at all, sometimes for decades at a time. It is also used by NASA as a test site for instruments to be used in future Mars missions.

One region in the Atacama – known as Red Stone – was a river delta

rists to Mars? Or will the New Morality and its allies force an end to all scientific research on the Red Planet?

Mars Life is classic near-future science fiction; it includes everything you'd expect from a thoughtful exploration of conditions on the Red Planet. And it's certainly "topical" when you consider the potential of the U.S. Mars rover mission to identify signs of Martian microbial life. Unfortunately, Mars Life is also "topical" in light of the rise of anti-scientific fundamentalism of late, with its associated book banning, censorship, and "parental influence" over school curricu-To my mind, one of the most horrifying scenes in the novel takes place in a middle school in Florida when a student's art project - a meticulous and accurate model of the Timonium Base on Mars has been rejected as "not an area that we can consider for class credit." When Bucky (the student) asks for the reason. the teacher says this:

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about a 100 million years ago (during the age of dinosaurs). Its rust color is caused by deposits of hematite. This Red Stone area of the Atacama seems to be much like the plateau within Jezero Crater that is currently being explored by the Mars rover *Perseverance*; it too was apparently a river delta about 3 billion years ago, when Mars had a thicker atmosphere and liquid water on the surface.

For some time now, researchers have been using state-of-the-art equipment to probe Atacama rocks in an effort to locate previously-unknown signs of life. This February, they reported finding genetic fragments from a strange mix of microbes. Their report (in the journal *Nature Communications*) states that some of the DNA fragments are "so strange and different" that researchers could not identify any known relatives. Lead researcher Armando Azua-Bustos (a microbiologist at the Center for Astrobiology in Madrid) reported: "In almost half of the cases, the databases could not clearly say what we had in our hands." He theorizes that these are "relic genetic material" from life forms long extinct and not previously documented.

But what, you ask, does this have to do with the search for life on Mars? Well, the same examination of Atacama soil samples was conducted in 2003 using versions of the instruments on the Mars rovers; and these earlier examinations could barely detect the microbial signatures at all – or entirely missed signs of life.

This has led scientists to conclude that the best hope of identifying possible signs of Martian life will be a multi-stage mission called "Mars Sample Return." The plan is to land another spacecraft on the surface of Mars, which would also serve as a launchpad for the return voyage. Samples of Martian materials - which Perseverance continues to dig up and securely store - will be transferred to the lander and launched into orbit. Then the samples will be will be transferred to a European-built orbiter and carried back to Earth sometime early in the next decade, where they can be analyzed under the best possible conditions and using the most up-todate instruments.
