Film News

The discussion about the next *Dune* movie drums up lots of squawk about the first movie being too ponderous. Peter and Rob spoke favorably about the new *Guardians of the Galaxy* movie. The *Babylon 5* animated movie uses the voice actors (who are still alive) from the live action series.

TV News

Rob discussed how ST: Deep Space Nine serves as a precursor modem Trek productions - with Federation characters making bad decisions. Jim painfully described the SyFy series The Ark; he hated it because the science is so bad. Peter describes the concept of a "puzzlebox" series (such as Lost), during which viewers must watch to get clues about what's going on; and he said the Westworld series falls into the puzzlebox category. Jim is loving Strange New Worlds, even if the bridge and Pike's stateroom are too large. Jim and Rob loved Season 3 of Picard, which centered upon fan service. Season 2 of Foundations is coming out.



Other News

Jim says that he enjoyed attending RavenCon 2023 (in Glen Allen, VA), with special guest Count Gore De Vol. He also recently went on a Jonathan Coulter "JoCo" cruise. A description: "Between main stage entertainment, workshops, crafts, panel discussions, live podcasts, readings by authors, musical performances, comedy shows, office hours, gaming events, land excursions, and shadow events – there's more hours of programming than there are in a week. No matter what your interest, we have you covered!" Sounds like a geek fest!

Rob advised everyone that the Nebula Awards 2023 ceremony is occurring this evening in Anaheim, CA.

Food and F&SF, Part 2

In last month's issue, I began this (very short) series of articles about two books that illustrate the relationship between F&SF and food. After a few introductory remarks, I reviewed the anthology *Galactic Stew* (Zombies Need Brains LLC, 2020). Unfortunately, I ran out of room before I could get to the review of the second book. So here it is now...


La Cuisine Humaine by Norman Spinrad ("independently published," 2018)

Norman Spinrad is one of my "go to" authors whenever I'm looking for something "wild and wonderful" to read. *La Cuisine Humaine* certainly fills the bill.

This little work – hardly more than a pamphlet – is subtitled "How to Cook Like a Human Being" and was purportedly "found in Hanger 51 by Norman Spinrad." The back cover describes it as "the only cookbook you will ever need to be able to cook like a human being—even if you already are one!!" The author says it was "prepared after several months on Earth sampling its fare and discussing culinary matters with both master chefs and a sampling of ordinary humans..." What a hoot!

The Introduction further explains that "a certain mania for La Cuisine Humaine has been sweeping the galaxy ever since the recent discovery of the humans' otherwise not-terribly-noteworthy civilization, resulting in many pleasurable new dining experiences, but also, alas, the prevalence of all too many misconceived and loath-some concoctions that the humans themselves would rightly consider vile desecrations."

The author frequently reinforces the contention that this is "not a cookbook" – it's <u>not</u> a collection of step-by-step recipes (so many teaspoons of salt, so many cups of flour, etc., etc.). The author lists and describes all the ingredients used for various human dishes, but it exhorts readers to "Experiment, improvise, invent!" You know... one of those "add to taste" kind'a things. There



are dozens and dozens and dozens of mouth-watering descriptions of how to prepare various human dishes.

Here are a few sample passages to give you some idea of the delightful reading experience in store for readers:

- "Pastas may have been developed as a basic universal metabolic fuel for impoverished mass populations, but the culinary ingenuity of the humans has long since made an artistic virtue of economic necessity by transforming this industrial fodder into the raw material for haute cuisine."
- "In America, a 'hamburger' may be simply a fried patty of chopped beef slapped between two pieces of pallid bread slathered with an odious sweetened tomato sauce called 'ketchup,' or it may be covered with melted cheese, bacon, mushrooms, green chilies, satay sauce, taco sauce and entire salads to reach the status of culinary art."
- "When it comes to politics, economics, science, philosophy, or how to manage a planetary ecosystem, this immature civilization may indeed have nothing to teach us, but when it comes to the culinary arts, we could all certainly enhance our galactic kitchenculture and interstellar dining-room civilization by learning to cook like human beings."

As far as I can tell, the only place to get your hands on this little gem is via Amazon.com or similar sources. It only costs about five dollars. Well worth the price, says I!



Star Eats Planet! info passed along by Carl



I'm sure you've heard stories about how a dying star becomes a red giant and swallows all its planets within a certain distance. Scientists believe this to be a fairly common occurrence across the universe; but they've never actually seen it happen—until now. Past studies have only observed stars just before or after they swallowed planets.

As reported in Science News, astronomers at CalTech, Harvard, MIT, and other schools detected a star turning into a red giant and consuming one of it orbiting planets. The star is close to the constellation Aquila, about 12,000 light years away; and it became 100 times brighter for over 10 days. Researchers theorize that this represents a jovian (Jupiter-sized) world falling into its host star. The burst was first observed in May 2020; and it took roughly a year to figure out what happened. Using the NEOWISE infrared telescope, the team decided that it wasn't a case of two merging stars. The energy from the outburst was only a thousandth of what it should have been in a collision of two stars; and it emitted a stream of cold dust rather than hot plasma. Kishalay De (MIT) noted that our Sun and Jupiter provided a good cross-reference, because Jupiter's mass is about a thousandth of the Sun's mass.

This sighting also provides a glimpse into the future – roughly 5 billion years from now – when the Sun dies and it's believed that it will consume the Earth and the other inner planets of the Solar System.
