James R. Crutchfield 1945 – 2023

We are saddened to report that long-time LSFer James Crutchfield passed away from natural causes at his home on July 29th.

James was an active LSF participant for over a decade; and for a number of years he hosted LSF's monthly social meetings at his Dupont Circle apartment. Rob has noted that those years saw LSF's greatest growth, due in part to the central location and ease of Metro access afforded by James's apartment. Some of James's F&SF interests included *Supernatural*, *True Blood*, *Chuck*, *Heroes*, and Laurell Hamilton's "Anita Blake" series. James was also an active supporter of the Gaylaxicons hosted by LSF, variously running the art show and program book advertising.

After college, James enlisted in the U.S. Air Force and served for 12 years, with tours of duty in the Philippines, Vietnam, Germany, Florida, and New York. He was honorably discharged in 1976 and moved to Washington DC. He worked briefly at a civilian job at the Pentagon before beginning a 24-year tenure with the Federal Communication Commission.

When James moved to Washington DC in 1976, he discovered the gay Friends Radio program, Lambda Rising Bookstore, and The Blade. This put him in touch with Washington's gay community and led to a lifetime of involvement with that community. In one interview, James said: "I did my first protest when Anita Bryant came to town [January 1978]. From there [my involvement] became a snowball rolling down the hill and carrying me forward with it into many other things." A biographical write-up says that the long list of James's community endeavors and leadership efforts began around 1978, when he served as secretary for the Metropolitan Community Church's Prison Outreach Committee and volunteered for the MCC Homeless Women Feeding Program (1978-1981).

James was a member of the Gay and Lesbian Activists Alliance (GLAA) for over 30 years and served for two years as an office manager. He served on the board of the DC Gay Community Center for seven years and was its president from 1982 to 1988. It was reported that under his leadership the Community Center became a central meeting space and support organization for new community organizations. In 2000, he was invited to become one of the 5 founding members of the Rainbow History Project because of his encyclopedic knowledge of DC's gay history and personalities; he served on the Rainbow History board for nine years.

James served for two years as president of the Capital Area Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Veterans of America and as secretary for an earlier local LGBT veterans group. His concerns for gay youth led him to become a founding member of SMYAL (Sexual Minority Youth Assistance League) in 1984 and to serve on its board for 2 years. His interest in sports led to his involvement with DC sports organizations and gay bowling leagues. He served for six years as president of CARA (Capital Area RainBowlers Association) - where he acquired the nickname "Hawk."

A 2009 write-up of James by the Rainbow History Project named him an LGBT Community Pioneer and described him as "a community builder, one of those hard-working people and a classic example of the busy person others ask to get things done." Capital Pride declared him a Hero of Pride in 2004.

Minutes of the August LSF Meeting taken by Scott

Carl discussed the recent passing of long-time LSF member James "Hawk" Crutchfield. It was noted that James hosted LSF's monthly meetings for several years at his Dupont Circle apartment; and Rob noted that this coincided with a significant growth period for LSF, in part due to the central location and Metro-accessibility of James's apartment.

An LSF tabletop gaming party is scheduled for Saturday, September 9th.

TV News

Rob is enjoying the second season of Harley Quinn (on HBO Max). One episode's plot revolves around the hottest ass in Gotham City belonging to Nightwing. (Take that, Captain America!) General consensus is that the series Foundation (on Apple+) is visually stunning, but boring. Peter contrasted it to the series For All Mankind, which he found to be compelling and energizing. My Pick for the 2023 Best Dramatic Presentation, Long Form Hugo by Peter Knapp

Every year I try to pick the nominees and then the winners of the two Best Dramatic Presentation Hugo awards. I missed creating a nominee list, but I want to share my picks before the award ceremony on October 21, 2023 at Chengdu Worldcon, the 81st World Science Fiction Convention.

Best Dramatic Presentation, Long Form Hugo

This category is easy for me... Everything Everywhere All at Once blew me away. It's an amazing movie about, a "middle-aged Chinese immigrant swept up into an insane adventure in which she alone can save existence by exploring other universes and connecting with the lives she could have led."

It's also about the power of love and tells a heartwarming story of how love can triumph over hate.

Exploring the multiverse is a very popular topic. The Daniels (Daniel Kwan and Daniel Scheinert) devised an original way of traveling through the multiverse, which was a lot of fun. Their realization of many universes, including one made up of sentient rocks with google eyes, led to a visual spectacle that I enjoyed watching.

It is rare that a genre movie wins the Academy Award for Best Picture. This movie won seven Academy Awards: Best Picture, Best Director, Best Original Screenplay (The Daniels), Best Film Editing (Paul Rogers), Best Actress (Michelle Yeoh), Best Supporting Actor (Ke Huy Quan), and Best Supporting Actress (Jamie Lee Curtis). Do yourself a favor and go see this movie if you haven't already done so! Bonus: There's queer content. I would rank the other nominees (except for *Nope*, which I haven't seen) in this order:

Severance (Season 1)

The premise of this show was very intriguing and very disturbing. "Mark leads a team of office workers whose memories have been surgically divided between their work and per-sonal lives. When a mysterious colleague appears outside of work, it begins a journey to discover the truth about their jobs."

The end of Season 1 leaves a lot of questions unanswered. I look for-ward to Season 2. Bonus: There's queer content.

Black Panther: Wakanda Forever

The most intriguing part of this sequel is the introduction of Prince Namor, the Submariner, played by be-stillmy-beating heart Tenoch Huerta (whose crotch was digitally reduced). I grew up wanting to be the Submariner, and this interpretation of the comic book character was very different from the source material. I was predisposed to not like this version of the character. I was pleasantly surprised by his performance and warmed up to the character quickly. In a lot of ways, this movie was a love letter to Chadwick Boseman, the actor who played the Black Panther in the original movie and died of colon cancer after filming the first movie. Black Panther: Wakanda Forever is not as good as the first movie, but it was a decent sequel.

Bonus: There's blink-and-youmiss-it queer content. "It's implied that new Dora Milaje warrior Aneka (Michaela Coel) has a relationship with veteran Ayo (Florence Kasumba)"
