We'll be trying this new model for the next several months and will then decide whether to keep it, go back to the general socializing model, or try new ideas.

There was an abundance of cookies available in the kitchen of our hosts, which everyone enjoyed!

<u>TV News</u>: Rob enjoyed seeing the Flash appear in a recent *Harley Quinn* episode. Jim likes the Apple+ series based upon Hugh Howey's dystopian *Silo* trilogy; he is also plodding through Apple+'s *Foundation* series, which is vaguely based upon the Asimov books. (Jim questions the need for a precog character, who was not in the original novels.) Rob feels that the *Babylon 5* animated movie was disappointing. The final season of *Archer* (shown on Hulu) has started.

AMC's *Interview with the Vampire* series is set in post-WWI America, rather than the antebellum South of the original novel – but this change in time period seems to work well. It was noted that the character of Claudia is about 14 in the current series and not a little girl as in the Anne Rice novel.

<u>Book News</u>: Carl reported that he is enjoying the collection *The Very Best of Caitlin R. Kiernan* (Tachyon Publications); and he's looking forward to next year's release of a collection of Kiernan's dark science fiction stories. Rob described the libertarian bent at Baen Books, as tempered by Southern socio-religious influences.

<u>Other News</u>: Jim shared the sad news that the Hunt Valley Inn in Maryland is closing down permanently. The hotel has been home to many cons over the years, such as Shore Leave, Far Point, and (temporarily) Balticon. Jim recalled meeting actor Sally Kellerman, who was in an *Outer Limits* episode and a *Star Trek* episode.

In gaming news, both *Baldur's Gate 3* and *Starfield* have come out.

There was a brief discussion about the Wasteland Weekend (inspired by *Mad Max*) and the Neotroplis cyberpunk-themed festival – both held in the middle of the desert. (Good heavens!) There was also some discussion of the stormy-weather-woes of

My Pick for the 2023 Best Dramatic Presentation. Short Form Hugo

Every year I try to pick the nominees and then the winners of the two Best Dramatic Presentation Hugo awards. I missed creating a nominee list, but I want to share my picks before the award ceremony on October 21, 2023 at Chengdu Worldcon, the 81st World Science Fiction Convention. Last month I talked about the Best Dramatic Presentation, Long Form Hugo nominations. This month I'll tackle the Best Dramatic Presentation, Short Form Hugo nominations.

Episodes from four shows that I've already watched made the cut. Before ranking them, I decided to rewatch the episodes, especially since I know I have biased opinions regarding the shows. I loved The Expanse, For All Mankind, and Stranger Things, I enjoyed She-Hulk: Attorney at Law, and I really had to force myself to watch Andor, which I thought was slow and meandering.

This can be a hard category to judge if one is trying to judge the individual episode, as most modern genre TV series are serialized shows. Each episode continues a story spread out among the whole season or even series. If I were to watch these nominees with no pre-knowledge of the show, would the episode hold its own? Probably not. I tried to think about how much the episode stood on its own while I rewatched them.

A note about the queer content in the nominees. All four shows had major queer characters. Only the nominated For All Mankind episode included the character's queerness as part of the episode. I think it says something positive that all five shows contained queer characters in their respective universes.

Here are my rankings.

1. The Expanse: "Babylon's Ashes"

I think The Expanse is one of

the best modern hard science fiction shows. The story follows three factions of humans, the United Nations of Earth and Luna, the Martian Congressional Republic on Mars, and the Outer Planets Alliance (OPA) fighting for control of precious resources and trying to control an alien protomolecule that threatens to destroy humanity. Spanning six seasons, this show is part hard science fiction (no warp drives or transporters) and part character driven drama with a bit of alien horror thrown in. "Babylon's Ashes" finishes the series in a very satisfying way, wrapping up most of the ongoing plots while keeping the door open for a future series. I think enough references to ongoing characteristics and situations would allow someone not familiar with the show to enjoy the show. Don't do that though...start from the beginning!

2. For All Mankind: "Stranger in a Strange Land"

I think For All Mankind is one of the best modern alternate history science fiction shows. Instead of the United States landing on the moon first in 1969, the Russians got to the moon first. Each season, the show jumps a decade. The third season takes place in the 1990s, with another space race to get to and colonize Mars. "Stranger in a Strange Land" finishes the season with a South Korean cosmonaut crash landing on Mars, a crisis on the now joint American and Soviet base as one of the astronauts has to get off the base to an orbiting space station to deliver her baby or die, a recently outed lesbian president dealing with the fallout of being outed, and a terrorist group trying to blow up the Johnson Space Center. While bad things happen, I think this is an optimistic show about the potential of mankind to better itself. Season 4, which I'm really looking forward to, launches November 10, with episodes dropping weekly on Apple TV+. A word of caution: the pacing of this show can be slow at times. I think the payoff after watching the burn is well worth it.

3. She-Hulk: Attorney at Law: "Whose Show is This?"

Disney+ Marvel shows have ranged from truly exceptional to meh. She-Hulk: Attorney at Law thankfully is closer to exceptional than *meh*. The show is about Jennifer Walters (Tatiana Maslany), an attorney accidentally infected by her cousin's blood, which results in her being able to turn into a green 6-foot-7-inch superpowered hulk. At times a law procedural show, at times a superhero show, and almost always presented as a fourth-wall-breaking dramedy, I found this show hysterically funny. The season finale "Whose Show is This?" not only breaks the fourth wall but crashes through it, with Jennifer not accepting the script, breaking out of her show through the Disney+ Marvel menu screen, and confronting the writers of the show and then Knowledge Enhanced Visual Interconnectivity Nexus — better known as K.E.V.I.N (an AI spoof of Marvel Studios president Kevin Feige) to demand a better ending. I laughed and laughed.

4. Stranger Things: "Chapter Four: Dear Billy"

Now in its fourth season, Stranger Things lovingly recreates the 1980s and pits a group of kids, teenagers, and a few adults against unimaginable horror. The show is well written, acted, and produced. It's a must-see TV show in my household. "Chapter Four: Dear Billy" is a stand-out (episode four of nine in the season). Because it picks up where episode three leaves off and sets the stage for episode five, I don't think it stands by itself as an award-winning stand-alone episode. That's why I rated it fourth after She-Hulk: Attorney at Law, which I don't love the way I love Stranger Things. Due to the ongoing Hollywood strikes, season five will probably premiere sometime in late 2025 or early 2026.

5. Andor: "One Way Out" 6. Andor: "Rix Road"

What can I say... I don't like this prequel Disney+ Star Wars series. This series follows Cassian Andor as he slowly, ever so slowly, decides to become the rebel hero of the best Disney Star Wars

movie, Rogue One: A Star Wars Story, which premiered in 2016. My perceived rhythm of the show was of two episodes of setup followed by one show where something actually happens, followed by the same pattern. In both "One Way Out" and "Rix Road" something happens. "One Way Out" is the third episode showing Andor in prison. In this episode he decides to break out and convinces his fellow prisoners to attack their captors and escape. It's one of the most self-contained episodes in the series, which is why I ranked it higher than "Rix Road," the season finale. The finale does show Andor finally becoming a rebel freedom fighter, after twelve episodes with a total running time of eight hours. Alas I didn't care. ΛΨΦ
