TV News

Derrick watched and enjoyed the 2000 movie *Pitch Black*.

Peter is watching the FX's Alien: Earth series, the events of which occur two years before the 1979 movie Alien. This series includes androids, augmented humans, and intelligent monsters. One of the sub-plots centers on hybrid prototypes created from terminally ill children. Peter also described the 8-part Korean NetFlix series Silent Sea: near-future Earth suffers from desertification and a team pursues a plan regarding potable lunar water.

Rob and Peter were satisfied with the finale of the NetFlix series *Resident Alien*. A shout-out to the series star Alan Tudyk.

Peter advised that Season 3 of the AppleTV+ series *Foundation* just aired its season finale. A Season 4 has been greenlighted.

There was a lengthy discussion of the British 1970s live-action series *UFO*, created by Gerry Anderson and Sylvia Anderson. (These were the folks behind *Supercar*, *Fireball XL5*, *Thunderbirds*, and *Space*: 1999.)

Katya advised that Season 5 of the NetFlix series *Stranger Things* is in the works. This season will be shared in three segments. The character of Will has been gay-coded leading up to Season 4. The big question is: will Will be gaining a power?

The HBO Max series *Peace-maker* might be portraying the main character as bisexual in Season 2.

Other News

Andy reported that he is enjoying A City on Mars: Can we settle space, should we settle space, and have we really thought this through? by Kelly Weinersmith and Zach Weinersmith. It's an often-humorous read making serious points about the apparent impossibility of settling Mars in the near future. It won the 2024 Hugo Award for Best Related Work

Sidewise Awards for Alternate History



2025 Sidewise Awards info passed along by Carl

The Sidewise Awards for Alternate History were created in late 1995 to honor the best alternate history publications of the year. The award takes its name from Murray Leinster's 1934 short story "Sidewise in Time," which explores a world in which a strange storm allows people to travel between alternate worlds. The first Sidewise Award was announced at LACon III (Summer of 1996). Each year, two awards are given: the Best Long Form Award presented to the best novel or complete series; and the Best Short Form Award presented to the best work under 60,000 words.

This year's Sidewise Awards were presented at the Seattle Worldcon on the evening of August 15th, following the panel "Alternate Histories of the Space Program." The 2025 Sidewise Awards (for works published in 2024) are:

- (Best Long Form) *Sargassa* by Sophie Burnham (DAW, 2024)
- (Best Short Form) "A Brother's Oath" by L. Briar (*A Bit of Luck*, Wordfire Press, February 2024)

Weird Stories, Part 1

It's that time of year again. The nights are getting longer; Halloween and *Dia de Muertos* and the Winter Solstice are approaching. As in previous years, I have enjoyed reading "weird," "creepy," "scary," or "dark" books in honor of the season.


As it turns out, almost all of the "weird" stories I've read this year are considered to be works of "folk horror." "What's 'folk horror'?" you ask. It's a horror subgenre that blends rural settings and isolation with ancient folklore, superstition, and paganism to create an atmosphere of fear and foreboding in a clash between "old ways" and the "modern world." Frequent key features of folk horror stories are remote landscapes, isolated communities, and ancient traditions such as witchcraft, diabolism, or human sacrifice. The focus is on the psychological horror of forgotten cultural elements. The term "folk horror" was used in a review written by Rod Cooper (Kine Weekly, 1970) to describe the film The Devil's Touch (aka The Blood on Satan's Claw).

Without further ado, here's the first review of one of the weird books I've read this year.

John the Balladeer by Manly Wade Wellman (Valancourt Books, 2023)

I think this book isn't necessarily "folk *horror*" – but it's definitely "weird."

Manly Wade Wellman's writing career spanned over half a century, from the late 1920s to the early 1980s. He is sometimes referred to as "the dean of fantasy writers," although he wrote in a wide variety of other genres, including historical fiction, detective fiction, western fiction, juvenile fiction, and nonfiction. He's perhaps best remembered for his contributions to *Weird Tales* magazine. Some of his weird fiction stories have been adapted for television, including "The Valley Was Still" (*Twilight Zone*, 1961, as "Still Valley"),



"The Devil Is Not Mocked" (*Night Gallery*, 1971), and "Rouse Him Not" (*Monsters*, 1988).

I've always enjoyed Wellman's fantasy and horror stories that draw on the folklore of the Appalachian region – particularly his so-called "Silver John" (aka "John the Balladeer") stories. I particularly enjoy his ability to incorporate the tenor and rhythm of Appalachian language and expression. Imagine my delight when I finally ran across a collection of *all seventeen* Silver John short stories in one volume!

John (last name never revealed) is the typical loner hero. He's a wandering singer who carries a guitar strung with pure silver. The time period is never mentioned in any of the stories, but it appears to be the mid-Twentieth Century. In his travels throughout the lesser-known backwoods of the Appalachians, he relies on his courage, wit, and essential goodness to triumph over various malignant creatures and folktale monstrosities of the mountain people. (The silver strings of his guitar often come in handy, too.) Here are some examples of his supernatural opponents: the Ugly Bird (a supernatural raptor), the Desrick (a predatory house), One Other (that haunts the Bottomless

Pool on Hark Mountain), the giant Rafe Enoch (a descendant of the Biblical "giants in the earth"), and various and sundry nefarious practitioners of dark magic.

John is sort of a combination folksy knight errant and wandering minstrel. His personal philosophy of life seems to derive from a form of Gospelbased Christianity; and the songs included in almost every story are a combination of actual folk music "from the hills" (based on Wellman's extensive research and experience) and songs masterfully created by Wellman himself.

As I said, I've been a big fan of Wellman's Silver John stories for decades. It was a delight getting reacquaintted with such classics as "O Ugly Bird!" and "The Desrick on Yandro" and "Old Devlins Was A-Waiting." It was a special treat to read several Silver John stories that I'd hadn't run across before, such as "Owls Hoot in the Daytime" and "Nobody Ever Goes There." It was an especial treat for me that, in addition to 17 short stories, this collection also includes eleven short Silver John vignettes that haven't been previously collected in any volume that I knew of. Each vignette is anywhere from a few paragraphs to a half-page long; and they all demonstrate Wellman's skill at writing very short (but satisfying) fantasy or dark fantasy. I highly recommend John the Balladeer.

Note: Wellman also wrote five short novels about Silver John: *The Old Gods Waken* (1979), *After Dark* (1980), *The Lost and the Lurking* (1981), *The Hanging Stones* (1982), and *The Voice of the Mountain* (1984). I've read them all. They're good, but I think Wellman's real skill is in writing short stories like those collected in *John the Balladeer*.
